The trustees are pleased to present their annual directors' report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year ending 31 March 2021 which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and accounts for Companies Act purposes.

STATEMENT OF THE JOINT CHAIRS

It has been a year of unprecedented challenge due to the global Covid-19 pandemic that has seriously impacted on the operation and finances of the charity. The Farm was required to close in April 2020 as part of the Government's national lockdown restrictions and has followed government guidance throughout the remainder of the pandemic.

We have put in place and followed a Covid-19 Organisational Risk Assessment as required by the Government and this has guided us through the tightening and loosening of restrictions that has been a feature of this period.

We are very grateful for the help and support that has enabled the charity to continue through this difficult time and in particular we would like to thank all trustees, staff, volunteers, service users, funders and partners who have contributed in so many different ways.

We instigated a fundraising campaign at the beginning of the pandemic to try to lessen the financial impact on the organisation and we were delighted by the generosity of people from across the city who responded to our crowdfunding campaign and contributed much needed funds. In addition, we have been very grateful for monies received from the Job Retention Scheme and the Covid Business Support Grants administered by Leeds City Council as well as from the National Lottery and all the funders listed below.

A particular big thank you is once again owed to Leeds City Council who have continued to provide grant funding and other support this financial year.

We have continued to run our regular Management Committee meetings throughout this year, albeit virtually and have been successfully running a new subcommittee structure that helps to give extra oversight and governance of the organisation. We have been working on refreshing the charity's objects which will feed into a wider piece of work to reimagine our mission and vision and update our Articles of Association. The Management Committee continues to monitor and carry out actions to ensure the good financial management of the organisation. This has included enacting an approach that requires the organisation to do all it can to finish each financial year with a surplus that, in the first instance, can be used to replenish our reserves. We are grateful to all the trustees for their hard work and dedication once again this year.

Despite the challenges of the pandemic, we are pleased we have been able to complete long standing projects such as the new bridge over the Beck to the courtyard and café and the installation of our new hen houses and improved outdoor area for the hens, as well as being able to carry out further improvements to the site. Welcoming back visitors to the Farm as well as our service users and schools is lovely to see and we hope we are able to fully reopen over the coming months.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REVIEW

This year has seen us respond and adapt to the Covid-19 pandemic which clearly has impacted on our usual activities and projects. For significant parts of the year, we were completely closed to the public and to our groups of young people and adults with learning disabilities. At other times, when national restrictions were reduced, we have been open but with strict covid restrictions in place around the Farm. Although a number of the staff team have had periods of being furloughed under the Government's Job Retention Scheme, we have had a core group of staff and volunteers at the Farm throughout the entire pandemic ensuring the site and our animals are safe and secure. I would like to thank all of the staff and volunteers who have helped us through these difficult times.

The covid pandemic has meant that we have had to very significantly reduce the amount of work that we are able to do with schools throughout the period, with most schools stopping their off-site activities. This has meant our usual number of children and teachers participating in educational projects at the farm has been minimal and we were unable to run our annual summer holiday playscheme. Likewise, our Reconnect programmes to disaffected high school pupils and students with a learning disability have not been able to run as planned although, where possible and allowed under government guidelines, we have taken a small number of individuals on this programme. Many people have continued to donate second hand bikes to the Farm and we have refurbished many of these ready to sell to the public again during the periods we have been open. The education team developed some online activities on our website for children and families to use from home during the lockdown periods.

The HOOF programme for people with a learning disability also had to cease on site during large parts of this period although we tried to offer some Facebook live events from the Farm so that some of our groups could see what was going on at the Farm and have the chance to see some of the staff who remained on site. When restrictions allowed, we have tried to offer this group the chance to be back at the Farm at least one day a week with the aim of returning to our pre-covid timetable as soon as we are able to.

Unfortunately, our regular events at the Farm such as our Easter, Summer and Christmas Fairs have not been able to take place this year due to the pandemic. Hopefully we will be able to resume our events next year.

During the year our market garden team has continued to bring underused/derelict areas on the market garden back into productive use and we have been able to operate a volunteer programme on the market garden when restrictions allowed, to help with food production. The volunteer programme has operated under our strict Covid Framework. Many of the volunteers who have participated have expressed how being able to be at the Farm assisting us to grow food has really helped with their mental wellbeing over this period. We have been able to expand the numbers of weekly vegetable boxes that we have sold to local people this year and have supplied local cafés, restaurants and suppliers with fresh vegetables. In addition, surplus vegetables have been sent to Rainbow Junktion – a local café that aims to reduce food waste and food poverty.

Our allotments that we rent out to local people have also been a haven for people through the pandemic, who have been able to tend to their plot and safely interact with others in the outdoors. We have also been working with local Meanwood charity, Interact, to develop a "men in shed's" style project aimed at reaching out to socially isolated men in the area and this has included the placing of a brand-new shed on the allotment as their base.

Particular thanks are owed to Sarah Ackroyd who runs her Forest School project from the Farm providing parents and toddlers with an enriching outdoor experience. This has run, when allowed under the Government restrictions, and has proved to be a real place of tranquillity and renewal for some families who have really suffered through the pandemic.

We continue to increase the numbers of individuals and families who have become Members of the Farm, and I would like to thank all Members, including those who kindly renew each year, for their ongoing support and financial contribution, which is very much appreciated.

We have started during this year to rent out some of our underused indoor and outdoor spaces on the Farm to a number of local businesses that fit into the ethos of the Farm, bringing a new source of regular income for the charity as well as new energy and activities. These include a willow weaving business, a therapeutic gardening business, a wood work, design business and a first aid company. A number of these businesses are planning on running workshops and events to the general public from the Farm. Some of our outdoor spaces are being used by local artists and dance practitioners to run outdoor workshops and rehearsal space. We hope in the coming months to develop close working with our neighbours to establish new partnerships and activities including festivals and events.

I am very grateful for the many hours of support that the Farm's Trustees give to the Farm, in different ways, throughout the year and for all the guidance and advice that they give in meetings, sub committees and in person.

We hope that we will be able to resume our normal activities once again as we move out of the covid restrictions but it has been a real pleasure to see visitors and some of our service users return as we head in that direction. Thank you to everyone for your support through this difficult year.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

GOVERNING DOCUMENT

The concept of developing a city farm in Meanwood, Leeds was the inspiration of community workers in 1979 and coincided with the establishment of the City farm movement nationally. This enthusiastic and determined group brought together volunteers to progress this vision. Land was leased from Leeds City Council and the Meanwood Valley Urban Farm opened on the 1 April 1980.

The organisation was incorporated as a company limited by guarantee and not having a share capital (Company registration 1509788) on the 29 July 1980 and registered as a charity (charity No. 510452) on 18 September 1980. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

The charitable company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established its objects and powers and is governed under its Articles of Association.

The Farm holds an agreement for a Farm Business Tenancy (fixed term) with Leeds City Council for a term of 50 years from the 11 April 1997. The 24-acre site is located 2 miles north of the centre of Leeds.

THE MANAGEMENT COMITTEE AND ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for purposes of charity law and under the company's Articles are known as members of the Management Committee. Under these Articles

Members of the Management Committee are elected annually at the Annual General Meeting from amongst the Farm's membership. The Articles provide for there to be up to 10 members on the Management Committee, of which 4 are designated as office holders. During the year, the Management Committee does have the right to co-opt additional persons on to the Board to fill vacancies, plus up to three persons to provide special expertise.

The Management Committee keep under review its skill mix, with the current committee having a broad range of professional, business and educational skills and experiences. Most Trustees have been involved with the Farm prior to being elected onto the Management Committee and new committee members are given an induction to the Farm by the Chair and the Chief Executive as well as being provided with information as to the role and responsibilities of charity trustees. All Trustees give their time freely and no trustee remuneration was paid in the year.

The Management Committee mostly meets monthly and is responsible for strategic policy setting and decision-making including reviewing and monitoring the activities of the Farm. Day to day operational management is delegated to the Chief Executive, who in turn is supported by a senior management team. Although the COVID-19 pandemic has impacted upon the ability of the Management Committee to meet together, in the interests of good governance the Management Committee and its various sub committees have continued to fulfil their responsibilities meeting regularly via video conferencing facilities.

During 2020/21 the Farm was a member of the city farm network known as Social Farms and Gardens.

Related Parties

For a number of years, the Farm has had a close relationship with Leeds City Council. In addition, to being the Farm's landlord, the City Council also provides significant funding by way of grants and contracts for providing services to the community. One of the Trustees runs a company that provides first aid training to the Farm.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES FOR PUBLIC BENEFIT

The Farm's objects and principal activities are:

- Leisure and recreation promoting the benefit and well-being of all persons in the locality by providing a leisure and recreational facility.
- Education and training advancing general environmental education and awareness and the provision of education and training for persons so as to prepare them for any trade, occupation or service.

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 17(5) of the 2011 Charities Act to have due regard to guidance published by the Charity Commission relating to public benefit when reviewing the Charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities. The Farm mainly relies upon grants and income from educational and training activities, but does also generate some income from admission charges, events, room hire, cafe, agricultural sales and farm shop. In setting the level of fees charges and concessions, the Trustees give careful consideration to the accessibility of the Farm to those on low income.

The Farm's strategy is to deliver its objectives by:

- Ensuring that school children and city dwellers have access to a rural experience.
- Developing environmental initiatives and interpretation.
- Consolidating existing and developing new partnerships to deliver quality learning experiences to socially excluded groups.
- Providing an environment where our people can achieve their potential and so enhance our communities.
- Focusing on quality as seen by our customers and delivering a consistent and safe service.

Our values are

- Being proactive in developing services to the community to address social exclusion.
- Acting with trust and integrity.
- Valuing our people, using their creativity to innovate and bring about continual improvement.
- Behaving with clarity, trust and openness, encouraging participation and giving support when needed.
- Positively addressing social exclusion and empowering individuals to achieve their potential.

The Farm is committed to the safeguarding of children and vulnerable adults who attend the Farm as either customers who participate on our various training programmes or visitors and has developed appropriate policies and procedures accordingly.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The Farm during 2020/2021 made an unrestricted surplus of £25,910 (2019/2020 deficit of £45,503). However, after taking account of a transfer to restricted funds of £6,401 to meet a funding gap on the new bridge, the surplus reduced to £19,509. At 31 March 2021, the Farm's unrestricted reserves stood at £81,997 (2019/2020 was £62,488).

The Farm's main sources of income continue to be public bodies, including Leeds City Council. Most of the Farm's income and expenditure is in support of its two main charitable activities as summarised below:

2020/21 was one of, if not the most challenging year that the Farm has faced in its 41-year history. Due to the pandemic, for significant parts of the year the Farm was closed and not able to deliver its education and training programmes or welcome visitors. Even when open it has had to operate within strict COVID restrictions. It is only through the continuing financial support of our funders, grant support from the various Government COVID support programmes and the Farm's own "Just Giving" fund raising campaign that the Farm has been able to survive the year and indeed generate a surplus. Income from Education and Training was down by £22,197 on the previous year and income from Leisure and Recreation down by £20,002. However, these shortfalls were more than offset by COVID government support grants of £102,413 whilst the Just Giving campaign generated £25,607. Expenditure was up by £14,530 on the previous year which is largely accounted for by staff costs which were up by £13,659.

The capital restricted funds represent capital grants and contributions that the Farm has received to finance the acquisition and enhancement of fixed assets which are subject to depreciation. As such the balance on these accounts represents the extent to which these capital grants and contributions have not been written back.

The income restricted funds represent income that the Farm has received which is earmarked for specific projects. The balance as at 31 March 2021 represents unexpended resources that are earmarked to fund future expenditure on the project.

RESERVES POLICY

The Farm's free reserves at the 31 March 2021 stood at £76,993 (2019/2020 was £56,752). The Management Committee have previously established a policy as to the level of reserves that it should maintain in order to deal with a significant drop in funding which is £85,000. At this level the Management Committee feel that they would be able to continue the current activities of the Farm for a period of time in the event of a significant drop in funding, whilst considering how funding would be replaced or activities changed.

The Management Committee is aware that free reserves as at 31 March 2021 are below the level set by it's reserves policy. In accordance with it's reserves policy the Management Committee are currently taking a variety of actions to control spending and to generate additional funding and remain confident in the Farm's financial viability.

STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE/DIRECTORS

The charity trustees/management committee (who are also the directors for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing a trustees' annual report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations and in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each year. Under company law, the trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure for the financial year. In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and that enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the Year Ended 31 March 2021

1. COMPANY INFORMATION

Meanwood Valley Urban Farm Ltd is a charitable company, limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales. The company's registered number and registered office address can be found on the Company Information pages.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Companies Act 2006 and the Charities Act 2011.

The company meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The trustees consider there are no material uncertainties about the company's ability to continue as a going concern as described in the Reserves Policy section.

Incoming resources

Income is recognised in the period in which the charity is entitled to receipt and the amount can be measured with reasonable certainty. Income is deferred only when the charity has to fulfil conditions before becoming entitled to it or where the donor has specified that the income is to be expended in a future period.

Grants receivable for revenue expenditure

Grants from the local government and other agencies have been included as income from activities in furtherance of the charity's objects where these amount to a contract for services.

Donations receivable for capital expenditure

Donations and gifts are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities when the conditions for receipt have been complied with.

Activities to generate funds

Activities to generate funds are accounted for when the conditions for their receipt have been met.

Investment income

Investment income is accounted for when receivable.

Resources expended and basis of allocation of costs

Expenditure is included when incurred and includes attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.

Expenditure on operational programmes is recognised in the period in which it is incurred. A designated fund is established for expenditure which has been committed to projects, but remains unspent at the year end.

The majority of costs are directly attributable to specific activities. Certain shared costs are apportioned to activities in furtherance of the objects of the charity. Staff costs are allocated according to the costs of staff working directly in the relevant departments.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the Year Ended 31 March 2021

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Governance

Governance costs comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice. These costs include costs related to statutory audit and legal fees together with an apportionment of overhead and support costs.

Allocation of overhead and support costs

These costs, which include staff costs and premises costs and other day to day costs of the charity are apportioned between the two core activities on the basis of estimated time and cost spent on each activity.

Fund-raising costs

Funds held by the charity are:

Unrestricted general funds – these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees. Such funds may be held in order to finance both working capital and capital investment, as well as funding under-funded projects.

Restricted funds- these are funds that can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the accounts.

Tangible fixed assets

In the main fixed assets in previous years when acquired were written off against the receipt of capital expenditure grants. From 1 April 1996 expenditure on fixed assets has been capitalised.

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Buildings - 4% on straight line
Plant and equipment - 15% on reducing balance
Motor vehicles - 25% on reducing balance

Stocks

Stock has been valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value on the first in, first out basis, consistent with prior years. Repairs and renewals are charged directly against revenue.

Taxation

The charity, being a registered charity, is exempt from the payment of income and corporation tax.

Pension Cost

The charity operates a Stakeholder Pension Scheme which is accessible to staff.

3. LIABILITY OF MEMBERS

Meanwood Valley Urban Farm Limited is a company limited by guarantee and the members' liabilities are limited to £1.

17. RESTRICTED FUNDS (Continued)

The capital restricted funds represent capital grants and contributions that the Farm has received to finance the acquisition and enhancement of fixed assets which are subject to depreciation. The grants and contributions are released in line with depreciation charges, and the balances on these accounts thus represent the extent to which the capital grants and contributions have not been written back.

The fund transfer of £6,401 represents a transfer from unrestricted to restricted funds to finance the Bridge Reinstatement and Bank Erosion Control Project.

The income restricted funds represent income that the Farm has received which is earmarked for specific projects. These include:

- The Education Fund was established for the development of the Farm's educational service, for the purchase of educational equipment and materials. It also includes funding received for an internship, the cost of which covers more than one year.
- The Livestock Fund was established for the purchase of farm animals and related equipment.
- The Robert Collins Fund was established for the purchase of plants and equipment.
- The Interpretation Fund was established to raise funds to upgrade signage to the site.
- The Site Improvements Fund was established for the purchase of equipment and repairs to the site.
- The Fencing Fund was established to upgrade fencing to the site.
- The Volunteer Fund was established to raise funds to provide materials for Corporate Social Responsibility volunteering projects.
- The Hen House Fund was established to raise funds to rebuild the Hen House.
- The Bridge Reinstatement and Bank Erosion Control Project was established to raise funds to replace the bridge on the Farm site spanning Meanwood Beck and install erosion control measures.
- The Courtyard Improvement Fund was established to raise funds to improve the courtyard.
- The Education Internship Training Fund was established to raise funds to be used for the training of the Farm's internee.
- The Market Garden Fund has been set up to raise external funds for the development of the Farm's market garden, and includes grants which have been successfully applied for which cover more than one financial year.
- The Defibrillator Fund has been set up to raise funds for the provision of a defibrillator at the Farm.
